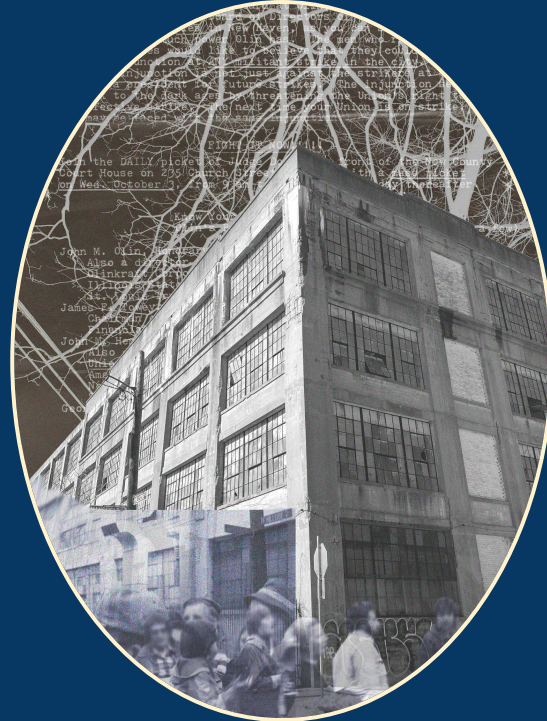

In the picture above, the men are working with one of the largest cranes in the city, leased from the

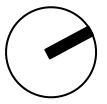
Kramer Iron Works. It has a boom length of 110 feet and at the time of the photograph was lowering the old windows from the third floor.

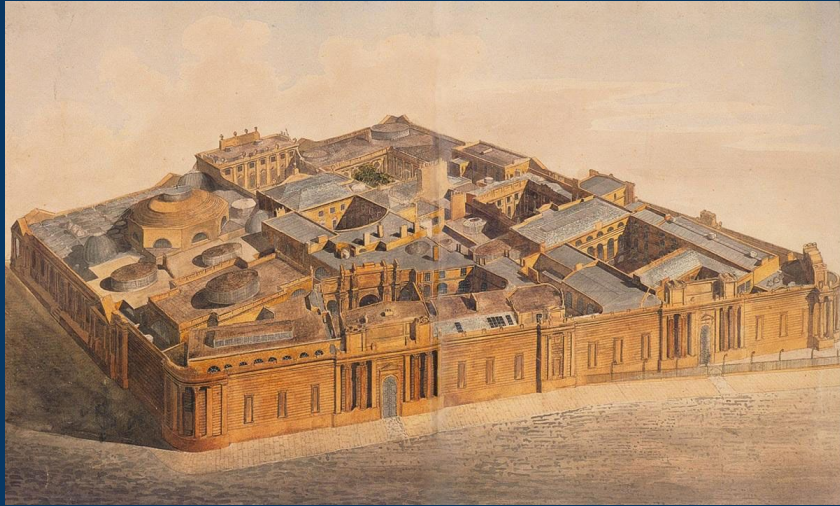
ous at times, but peaceful. The workers voted overwhelmingly Sunday to stage the strike. (Story, other photo, on Page 1)
